What does the fund invest in?

The fund seeks to provide a regular stream of income with the potential for modest long-term capital growth by investing primarily in Canadian and U.S. higher-yielding fixed income securities, income trusts, convertible securities, mortgage-backed securities and money market instruments, either directly or through securities of other mutual funds. The fund also invests in Canadian and foreign common and preferred equity securities. The fund may invest up to 30% of its assets, either directly or through Underlying Funds, in foreign securities. The fund's asset class weightings generally range between 45–65% in equity securities and 35–55% in fixed income securities.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on August 31, 2024. The fund's investments will change.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with a higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

No guarantees

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

Risk rating

CLIML has rated the volatility of this fund as **low to medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

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How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series F securities of the fund has performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series F securities of the fund performed in each of the past 10 calendar years. The fund's value has decreased in 2 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- seek an income-oriented Canadian balanced fund to hold as a key part of their portfolio
- want a medium term investment
- can handle the volatility of stock and bond markets

Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series F securities of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in Series F 10 years ago would have had 1,555 as of August 31, 2024. This is equal to an annual compounded return of approximately 4.5%.

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series F securities of the fund.

The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

You pay no sales charges when you buy Series F of this fund.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As of March 31, 2024, the fund's expenses were 1.05% of its value. This equals 10.50 for every 1,000 invested.

No trailing commissions are paid for Series F of this fund.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch securities of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Asset-Based Fee	Series F securities are available exclusively to investors who have a fee based arrangement with their representative's firm. You and your representative decide on an annual asset-based fee of 0-1.5% based on the average daily market value of your investment. This fee is paid to your representative's firm and is in addition to the expenses payable by the fund. If instructed, CLIML will deduct the fees from your account by redeeming securities of a fund that you have designated in advance and will remit the proceeds to your representative's firm on your behalf.
Switch fee	If you switch between series of the fund or to another Counsel fund, you may pay your representative's firm a switch fee of 0%-2%.
Inappropriate short-term trading fee	A fee of 2% of the amount switched or redeemed may be charged by the fund for inappropriate short-term trading which is defined as trading within a short period of time (less than 30 days) that CLIML believes is detrimental to fund investors.
Excessive short-term trading fee	A fee of 1% of the amount switched or redeemed may be charged by the fund if you invest in the fund for less than 30 days and your trading is part of a pattern of short-term trading that CLIML believes is detrimental to fund investors.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund securities within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory. For more information, see the securities law of your province or territory or ask a lawyer.
